Gathering hogs at a 20,000-acre ranch made easier with cur dogs

AST MANATEE—
Perched atop a
camouflaged Jeep, I'm
bouncing through swamp land
in East Manatee County.
On this vehicle, there is no
cover, no roll bar. It's been
modified so two seats—one on
which I am seated—are
elevated. So there's no shield
to a prickly morning wind that
begins to render my cheeks

Humb.

I look left and see a piece of the eastern sun poke above the horizon. A mist that begins at the ground and ends at the level of my head races around

Driving below me is Jason McKendree, the owner of this 20,000-acre ranch. His friend Cason Britt is riding shotgum, munching on corn dogs and potato wedges. Five cur dogs, patient in their close-quarter cases, bring up the rear

cages, bring up the rear.
"What do I like most about it?" McKendree says. "The adrenaline rush of the dogs working. I love to see dogs working. Whether it's with cattle, hogs, birds, whatever, I like to see dogs work."

We cross Interstate 70. "It's pretty nice this early," McKendree says. "Think how

much someone pays for this. You know, people pay \$500 to \$1,000 to go do this. This is a privilege for us."

privilege for us."
Sure is a peaceful morning.
The Jeep stops. About 70
yards ahead I see a black dot
and a brown blotch, resting on
a pasture of harvested sod. It's
two sows.

Then, it's as if someone flicks on the action music — Britt hops out and releases two dogs, who bound away. McKendree jogs behind the dogs, and Britt takes the wheel. We're off.

I see the sows move — it's not a run, but a waddle — away from the sod farm. The dogs are darting. Soon they're a few strides behind the hogs before the chase vanishes into a wall of Myrtle trees.

As we pull up, a sow unleashes a series of piercing grunts.

"Put your notebook down," Britt said. "And follow me."

Camera in hand, I leap off the Jeep, duck under the Myrtle trees and amble down a ditch, where a stream of water engulis my foot. I ramble on, lowering my head under some branches before rising to the

top of the ditch.

McKendree is pushing the
dogs off the incensed black
sow. The brown sow, which
jumped the corner, and Frisco,
one of McKendree's dogs, were
not around.

not around.

McKendree ties the sow's arms and legs together before dragging the sow from under the trees and tossing her onto

the Jeep.
I'm a bit stunned.
For McKendree, that's one
less hog that will churn up his
sod field. One less hog to
obstruct a driver. The goal, he
said, is to catch as many hogs
as possible and relocate them.

Frisco came back about 30 minutes later, after two more hogs were loaded on the Jeep. Throughout the rest of the trip, they catch two more — one in a previously set trap.

Fortunately, the dogs — Frisco, Faucur, Johnson, Stubby and Mickey Blue Eyes make it through the trip with no wounds.

Cur dogs, which originated in the southern United States, are working dogs. Their breeds date back to pioneer times. Sometimes, McKendree said, the scrappy dogs will run into large boar hogs who are capable of tossing the dogs around.

around.
When we return, the hogs are unloaded into a long trailer. In doing so, McKendree and Co. make sure they're not bit by the hogs, whose teeth may have life-threatening bacteria. The men pick animal lice from their hair. They don't dust off. Bed, Bath and Beyond this is

"Some people like to go out and spend \$100 getting drunk," McKendree said. "I spend maybe \$20 on fuel. Some people think this is cruel on the dogs, well, they could be in the pound, but we're here

well, they could be in the pound, but we're here supporting them and giving them a good life. So I tell those people, 'Leave me alone and have a nice day.' "
